## From the Pastor's Desk ...

I have found the daily news hard to hear these past months. Each day seems to bring news we do not want to hear. The news is filled with tensions between nations threatening nuclear war and our local reports of crime and violence in the city of Baltimore and the region around us. Scanning the news you find the reports of terrorism, neo-Nazis, and political turmoil, and natural disasters. Personal lives are touched by disease, grief, tragedy, and struggle. A song lyric from long ago asks, "is that all there is?"

As Christians we know a larger reality—there is more to the story than the focus on the negative. There is help and there is hope! While it may seem at time that evil has the upper hand, there is a name that is above all names and a power that is greater than any force that strives to go against it. In the midst of despair and threatening situations, I turn to Psalm 121 for assurance of God's presence:

<sup>1</sup>I lift up my eyes to the hills from where will my help come? <sup>2</sup> My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. <sup>3</sup> He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber. <sup>4</sup> He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.

As I write, the long-awaited celestial event of the eclipse is upon us. As deep darkness comes in the middle of the day, the psalmist uses the sun and the moon to remind us of God's protection:

<sup>5</sup> The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade at your right hand. <sup>6</sup> The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night.

As fleeting as the moments of darkness in an eclipse are the moments where it appears that evil triumphs in our world. The reassurance of God's protection are reflected in the final words of Psalm 121:

 <sup>7</sup> The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life.
 <sup>8</sup> The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore.

Even in the face of death, the power of our Lord triumphs. Jesus is the resurrection and the life. Jesus has triumphed over the power of death and all who believe in the Savior have the gift of abundant life now and life forevermore.



When the news of the day is anything but good, we have the Good News! Jesus spoke to his first disciples and to us: Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. (John 14:27)

## From the Lay Leader...

How was your summer? At Lovely Lane, ours was all wet.

Water is a funny thing. It can make your day or ruin it. A summer vacation by the by the water is great; swimming, surfing or sailing. But add in some rain, and suddenly it's a bad day.

At Lovely Lane this month, a little water in the wrong place is causing us great headache. We have water coming in through the roof. That is damaging the paint, dampening the carpet, and necessitating expensive roof repairs. On the extreme opposite end, we had a small flood in the lower level. As a result of this, we've had to close the museum, tear up carpet, test and treat for mold and do other recovery work.

And while our floods may not have been "biblical," they remind us that water is an important and potent image in the Bible. Even before "Let there be light," the Bible speaks of God's spirit moving over the water [Genesis 1:2]. And when God gathers the waters together, the earth we live on is created. But later in Genesis, God uses water to destroy the earth. Water shows up again and again in the Old Testament. It springs forth from a rock. It parts to let the Israelites pass, and closes to destroy their pursuers. It is poured over an altar that still is set aflame.

Water is a vital image in the New Testament as well. Jesus was baptized in it, he sent demons to drown themselves in it, and he walked on it. Miraculous as these were, each of these acts was merely a symbol of the larger meanings of God-withus.

With water playing such a major role in scripture and in the ministry of Christ, we know that God thinks this metaphor will help us understand something. But what?

Sure, water is life-giving and all around us, as are God and the Holy Spirit. But water can also be irritating, damaging or even deadly. There are times when we want more of it, and times when we want to be rid of it. Is that how we should see the Spirit of God?

Perhaps the water does not stand for some one thing. But as water flows and carves out valleys... in the way it changes from rain to snow to steam... it demonstrates of the transformative power of the Spirit – the ability of the Spirit not only to effect change in us, but in the world. It is our relationship with God that flows both ways and is ever in motion.

But what about water's potential to cause harm? This keeps us mindful that it is not enough to bathe ourselves in our faith and think that we are living the life God wants us to live. Like water, which must flow to stay fresh or risk stagnation, our faith must be constantly in motion. We must use it - with care - to transform for the better our own lives and the lives of those we touch. Used carelessly, our faith can be hurtful, and can even turn others away from God.

How can we know the difference?

It was Jesus who stilled the waters, and turned water into wine. If we allow Christ to be the transforming power in our own lives, then we can be sure our spirit will be as welcome as a cool drink of water on a hot summer day.
